

## Rex Minerals and SA Government Schools partner to guarantee jobs for regional students

Job opportunities for young people at a South Australian copper and gold mine set to start production in two years have been guaranteed in an agreement between the operator and the state government.

he Hillside iron oxide copper gold deposit, south of Ardrossan on the Yorke Peninsula's east coast, will be mined by Rex Minerals from the end of 2025. Rex Minerals chief operating officer Jason Schell said students from local schools would have access to jobs when operations commenced.

"When the mine is operational we'll have 350 roles in place and we're looking at partnering with 15 students per year leading up to our construction commissioning," Mr Schell said. "We have electricians, we have other pathways for plant operators, heavy machinery operators, and also setting up tertiary degrees and pathways for other disciplines and engineering degrees."

Education Minister Blair Boyer said the agreement would strengthen the community's relationship with the mine, especially for Ardrossan Area School and others. Ardrossan Area School year 11 student Jake Clifford said that he wanted to further his technical education in geology and mineralogy. "It's what I always wanted to do — my dad got me into it and it's super exciting," he said. "I wouldn't say I'd like to stay in the city, as such — I love it here." Jake said he was keen to encourage others to undertake the pathways program and stay in the region. "There needs to be more people in this area doing these sorts of things," he said.

Mr Schell said updates would be provided at a community meeting in Ardrossan on June 8, including details about business registrations, employment opportunities and road projects. Five-hundred jobs are expected to be created during the construction phase. Hundreds will be created when the mine is operating, which it is projected to do for 30 years. Rex Minerals said that its model for student pathways would be transferable to other projects. It holds an exploration licence covering 2,200 square kilometres across the Yorke Peninsula.

Hi everyone and welcome to winter!

Are you thinking about heading north or to a warmer place?

Before you go, please make sure you secure your home and let a neighbour or friend know you are going away so that they can keep a check on your property.

Perhaps someone could park their car in your driveway occasionally.

Make sure if you are taking the caravan or RV that it is in good working order and also that you take some **security precautions**:-

- Secure your number plates on your car, caravan, and RV with tamper-resistant screws to prevent number plate theft. Ask Nic (refer below) about getting some of these screws free of charge.
- Consider installing security devices such as key operated wheel clamps, tow ball coupling locks with padlocks, steering locks, and dual door handle/locks. These devices can deter a thief from attempting to tamper or steal your property, AND useful both away and when at home!
- Lock windows and doors when leaving your car and van even if only for a short time. You never know who is watching you.
- Don't leave things on view in your car or van as too much of a temptation for thieves.
- Consider installing a safe in the boot of your car or in your caravan or RV for smaller valuables, e.g. mobile phones, iPads, jewellery etc.

You may have received our Tidy Towns pamphlet in your letter box this past week. This was an attempt to promote the group whose members are increasingly getting less physically able to do the work that we previously did throughout the town.

If the group is to continue, we need to attract more people who can contribute a few hours a week to ensure that the work previously done carries on into the future.

We need to attract some younger, fitter, and more able people so that we, among other things, can operate the mowers, use the slashing equipment, operate chainsaws as well as things with long handles that (I personally have an aversion to), is becoming a bit too hard for our current members to handle.

A bit of less strenuous work with some basic garden tools is always needed. The weeds continue to sprout and take advantage of even the smallest amount of rain. Time flies past increasingly quicker, or so it seems at least. The Antics provides a unique way to pass on information to the community and showcase what the various volunteer and service groups in our town provide. There are over 45 individuals and groups (that I see on the contact list – and probably more) who contribute or are involved in town affairs not only in our town but up and down the Peninsula and afar.

Prior to distribution of the Antics every two months, there many people who sit down at their computers in the creation of the Antics to let the 1200 plus residents and countless others who read through its pages know of the valuable, and often unnoticed contribution they make to our community. The hours that they spend are innumerable.

All this information and effort is then reviewed by one person (immeasurable thanks to Holly) and a small band of helpers at the APA. So, it's good to recognise, while reading the Antics, of the work that goes into our little newsletter and the contribution that our volunteer groups put into our town.

What we at the Shed do is then able to be showcased and we are thankful for the opportunity to tell you what we do in the small contribution we make to the fabric of our community. Hopefully you don't find it too boring or repetitive.

Enough of that, on to what we've been doing. So far, we have made 9 Osprey nest platforms with 2 more in production this financial year, with a possibility of more next year. This project has been highly effective in increasing the breeding success of these endangered birds. The frames have been erected (or in preparation as we speak) not only on the Yorke Peninsula but as far spread as Ceduna and along the coast of the Eyre Peninsula, in Adelaide, on Kangaroo Island and the possibly the Southeast and Northeast of South Australia.

It's not only a funding opportunity for our Shed but has put Ardrossan on the map throughout our State, Australia and overseas to show that our little town can match the best of them. As a consequence of this, our efforts with the Osprey nests have presented us with an opportunity to manufacture Barn owl nests. We have made a trial box, and along with flat pack boxes and will be shortly showcasing this to other community groups so that they can produce them in their own areas.

Not only this but there is a chance to produce offshoots of the design and materials used for the nests to provide solutions to other bird problems of concern. More on this as we speak with the landscape and conservation groups who provide valuable environmental support throughout the Peninsula and our State.

The jetty trolley for Edithburgh that we've been slowly working towards is coming closer to completion. All coming together to a point where it is recognisable as an example of the infrastructure that supported the farming community on the Peninsula in years gone past. It is hard to imagine the tenacity, ingenuity and extremely hard work that was put into the transport and distribution of the grain grown by our early farmers. They did this with only basic infrastructure and equipment that is now achieved with massive modern plant and equipment that would have been unthinkable in those early times.

When you speak with some of the people who are still around and were involved with this in their early years, you would be amazed at what was achieved. It is well worth the time to visit our own Museum where you may look at some of the examples and information that showed what they did that created and what we now take for granted.

Our Shed extension is slowly progressing. It is a long and involved process that at times, seems never ending but getting closer.

Run out of time and space again! More in the next issue, lots more to tell you. We'd be pleased to see you drop in any time you like (we are open on Monday and Thursday, 9:00 am to 3:00 pm) and we're sure you'll find it a great experience to be a part of our friendly team, we're all having a great time. The kettle is always on!

We welcome any feedback that the Community may wish to provide. The Board contact details are available to community members via the Notice Board in the walkway near Ardrossan Pharmacy and you can contact the hospital should you wish to speak to the Executive Management Team.

On Wednesday May 3<sup>rd</sup> we had a consultant Michele Smith on site. Michele was contracted by Health Minister Picton to recommend a sustainable medical model to supply on-call health services in our community. The meeting was extremely positive, and if her recommendations are accepted, should lead to some very exciting news for both ACH and the community overall. We will keep you informed as developments occur.

Increasingly, telehealth will be playing a part in the provision of health services. At Ardrossan we are already using a program called SA Virtual Care Service (SAVCS) which provides virtual medical assistance for both acute and aged. Via a video link, a Medical Officer can dial in and see the patient/resident and offer medical assistance.

We are also working towards installing SAVES. This is a virtual emergency service which will link us to experienced rural GPs who provide remote medical assistance to patients who have been triaged by the nursing staff at local emergency departments.

Please be assured both Board and Management are working with the Doctors to try and ensure we have 24/7 coverage for our Accident and Emergency, Acute and our Aged Care Residents.

Telehealth programs are not meant to take the place of local doctors but are there to ensure services can continue at ACH when a local doctor is unavailable.

#### Star ratings:

Star Ratings allows you to compare the quality of aged care homes across Australia. Residential aged care homes are rated against four sub-categories: Compliance, Residents' Experience, Staffing and Quality Measures. They then receive an overall rating, with three stars considered acceptable.

What a great achievement for a facility such as ours to recently be rated 4 Stars. It was a brilliant result achieved against the odds and under some extreme conditions. Well done to absolutely every staff member and all our volunteers. We couldn't have done it without you.



#### **Across Australia:**

54 services (2 per cent) achieved five stars – excellent 964 services (39 per cent) achieved four stars – good 1,357 services (54 per cent) achieved three stars – acceptable 119 services (5 per cent) received two stars – improvement required 6 services (0 per cent) received one star – significant improvement.)

### Fashion through the Ages 1873-2023



An eagerly anticipated special event was held in the Ardrossan town hall on Friday 12th May. Hosted by the Ardrossan Branch of the National Trust, the event was attended by 180 people and all tickets were sold out for several months beforehand.

This was a fashion parade with a difference. Planning group members Wendy Lambert, Barbara Walkley, Meg Brown and Annette Rowntree organised an afternoon to showcase styles of clothing worn by local people spanning 150 years. The parade was a celebration of Ardrossan's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of proclamation as a township in 1873 as well as a registered event with the South Australian History Trust's History Festival held throughout the state each May. The theme for 2023 is "Wonder".

Models began the parade wearing current styles and gradually worked backwards in 10 year time frames to 1873. No commentary was needed thanks to a noticeboard made by David Lambert enabling the audience to keep track of the era and music appropriate to each decade provided by talented local pianist Dave Phillips.

In total 12 models of all ages (including one male model) showed around 130 garments. Accessories including hats, shoes, gloves, handbags and jewellery enhanced every outfit while some particular cameos featured changes in the "little black dress", militant Suffragettes, the trend of voluminous petticoats and the flappers of the Roaring Twenties.

Some of the models also demonstrated their acting skills. The audience witnessed afternoon tea parties, Suffragette demonstrations, the hallucinatory behaviour of the Swinging Sixties and even a little romance!

Clothing for the parade came from a variety of sources. Much of it was authentic and was borrowed from local people, some of the modern clothing was lent by Ardrossan businesses J28 and Bella Yorke and many of the older styles were made by seamstress and lead organiser Wendy Lambert.

The lucky ticket was drawn after the event and was won by Gwenyth Lodge who was delighted with her prize. The afternoon concluded with afternoon tea served by the "kitchen staff", all dressed appropriately for the occasion. "Fashion through the Ages" was a very successful event and a grand way to celebrate Ardrossan's founding in 1873.



Throughout the year in the lead up to our celebrations in October, we are endeavouring to share 150 facts about Ardrossan and our history. These facts are being shared regularly on our social media pages and a list of facts shared to date published here in the Antics each edition. Please find facts 41 - 60 shared on the next page.

### 150 Facts About Ardrossan Facts 41-60

- 41 Mr C Cane bought the first two grain harvesters ever to come to Ardrossan. The Federal Harvesters, built by Robinsons of Melbourne gave a 4 foot 6 inch cut.
- 42 The first working party of the Tidy Towns group was held Tuesday 1st of May 2001.
- 43 In 1955 the first bulk handled shipment of salt left from the port of Ardrossan.
- 44 After returning from war, John Oliver Baird, known as Oliver or "JO," set up a motor repair business with his brother-in-law J.B.R. Harrison, Harrison and Baird Mechanical and Electrical Engineers. In 1922 they built a new garage at 30 First Street, what is now the Newsagency.
- 45 The Hillside Copper Mine was founded 8 miles south of Ardrossan in 1895 by Mr Hill. The copper was found when pulling up a stump.
- 46 The first car to be driven into Ardrossan was a single cylinder Oldsmobile in 1903.
- 47 Ardrossan Football Club won their first Premiership in 1913.
- 48 The Scout and Guide Hall was opened by Sir Henry Rymill, Chief Commissioner, on March 22nd 1958.
- 49 Windara Reef is named after the Narungga name for the eastern section of Yorke Peninsula.
- 50 During 1968 enough persons holding First Aid certificates and prepared to volunteer were enrolled in the Ambulance Brigade. The first meeting of the Ardrossan Section was held on 5th December 1968. 13 members attended.
- 51 Ardrossan's first dentist was a Mr Nelson Blackmore who came in 1880.
- 52 The early pioneers sold stumps from land clearing for 5/6 a ton. The stumps were thrown into a truck with a frame on it at the jetty and then pushed the trucks by hand to the waiting ketches.
- 53 Horace Dinham claimed to have delivered the first load of wheat for shipment from Ardrossan. His farm was only 1 ½ miles west of the town.
- 54 The EFS (now CFS) was first formed on 4 August 1947 and the Foundation Officer in Charge was Mr Allan Feutrill.
- 55 The Ardrossan Progress Association has been in existence since 1945.
- 56 In April 1950 a traffic census was conducted in an effort to lobby for the improvement of the "appalling conditions" of the Coast Road. Over 3 days of the census the road carried a massive average of 18 vehicles per day!
- 57 Ardrossan's current hardware store (Home Hardware) first opened as a Mitre 10 store in April 1996. The building had previously been a Four Square store.
- 58 Miss Roberts, a governess at Parara Station, who later became Mrs P. Lamb, organised a branch of Red Cross in Ardrossan and during both World War I and World War II led the district in an effort unequalled on the Peninsula.
- 59 A.J. Jarrett commenced business in 1918 as a shipping agency from a small office on the corner of Fourth Street and North Terrace before opening Jarrett's Hardware at 24-28 First Street (currently the Hospital Op Shop) in 1920.
- 60 The Stump Jump Plough was manufactured from 1880 until 1935.




As we approach the half way point of the 2023 season, we have seen mixed results from the field and courts across all junior and senior grades.
