#### In the Community:

The Ardrossan Progress Association Committee are very pleased to have a few projects they have been working on becoming a reality.

- We are very pleased that the Information Centre and Museum were awarded winner in the Information Centre Category of the South Australian Tourism Awards. These awards raise the profile of the town encouraging travellers to visit the town.
- The Playground on the clifftop has been replaced with a new playground which has play equipment for all ages and abilities. APA thanks the Yorke Peninsula Council for making it possible to complete this project this year by donating two thirds of the cost of the project.
- Work on the World War One Memorial Garden has started with the walls now being built and the irrigation installed so planting holes can be dug for the plants. The paths and borders will be replaced once earthworks are complete.
- The pump track which will be placed on some of the old tennis courts near the World War One Memorial Garden will be arriving in Ardrossan in April if all goes to plan.
- The twelve Flagtrax systems are installed on light poles in the main street.
- APA will be painting some murals in town this December in the lead up to the 150-celebration year. The committee have decided to start with 3 murals in areas which will make an impact on people visiting Ardrossan.

In the Caravan Park: We are very pleased to be able to say that the Ardrossan Caravan Park was awarded the winner of the Caravan Parks Award in the South Australian Tourism awards. We thank Brett and Tania for all the work they put into this award and into developing the park this last year.



The Ardrossan brigade has been on the less busy side the last few months but a few of you may have heard the truck sirens going off on Monday nights. That has been for our Burn over training. This is a training that we do every year before the fire danger season. It is designed to keep our members safe if the fire gets too big for us and coming straight at the truck, and we cannot drive away. It is a requirement for every active fire fighter to do each year.

As of 15<sup>th</sup> of Nov the fire danger season has begun on Yorke Peninsula so, please check with council and the CFS website with what you are allowed to do. The CFS have also now adopted a new Fire Danger Rating (now called Fire Behaviour Index – FBI for short) system which consist of only four levels. They consist of Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic. If the FBI is forecasted to be extreme, it is expected to be a total fire ban so please stay up to date.

Recently we have had some wild weather and it has meant that we have had to help the SES who have been run of their feet. We are always there willing to help the SES and have had to do that with tree downs and the old sandbagging to help protect from flood waters.

A big congratulations to our captain who in the past month he and his wife have had a baby girl. Congratulations Peter and Mel Cook.

We will be having our annual Christmas hamper raffle again this year and would like to advise people that tickets are again for sale around the town and get in quick as the tickets are limited.

The quiz night was a huge success. Thank you to all who attended and to those who organised it. I would also like to congratulate the winners of the night well done.

Last Antics I asked how many volunteers we have, and the answer is we have around 13,500 state-wide.

# Ardrossan Watch SA

Hello everyone.

Welcome to Summer !?! We are all left with the question as to what it will be like!

Now we are coming up to a busy time this month with holidays, family gatherings and Christmas, so let's all enjoy, and stay happy and healthy. Please keep an eye on our neighbours to make sure they are okay and safe.

One of the things we need to start thinking about now is preparedness for summer. Yes, we have had much more rain than normal, and most things are lovely and green, but it won't take long to dry out. With all that growth around us, fire becomes a concern. We all remember how close danger was to us in 2019 across a large part of this side of the Peninsula and we know how windy it can be here too, so let's take precautions.

This is the time to start being fire safety conscious and clearing out gutters, cutting down long grass (and removing cuttings), and trimming trees. Also remove burnable materials just laying around such as old paint tins, mulch, inflammable materials etc. Ensure hoses are at ready access both at front and back of the house.

Also, put things of importance in a fireproof box and have it "ready to go". We have collated a list of some things to do and have prepared to take with you.

Important documents (can also have them recorded on a USB)

Medication, scripts and any other essentials

Fire blanket(s) and extinguisher in the house and in the car.

Make sure phone is charged at all times, have the charger too Water and essential supplies in the car and torch and handheld radio, batteries.

Make sure pets have identification on them in case they flee or are scared.

AND discuss with all family members and have a bushfire plan of what to do "in case".

For now though, here is wishing everyone a safe, healthy, and *MERRY CHRISTMAS*.

Do enjoy and here's hoping that 2023 brings us all better times as 2022 has certainly been testing for many.

## Friends of Park Terrace and Esplanade Reserves Parklands Grassland Project Update

Recently some requests have been received for up to date information on the parkland reserves project including timing of slashing and fire risk.

The overall aim of the project is to conserve and restore the coastal reserves/parklands adjacent Park Terrace east of Bridge Road and Esplanade north to Tiddy Widdy Road. This area contains the only good quality area of native grassland which originally covered almost all of the original Ardrossan township and nearby areas in 1873. The cemetery is an area of original woodland.

The grassland area has been identified as an area of Iron-grass grassland which is protected under the Commonwealth Biodiversity and Conservation Act as a critically endangered plant community in South Australia. About 90 native plant species have been located in the reserves which makes the area of major interest for natural science study and an asset for the town.

A lot more history and detail is contained in the Management Plan for the area which can be read on the web by searching on "Ardrossan Grassland". We will be active next year with signs and activities highlighting the site as part of Ardrossan 150 celebrations.

The project started with a Management Plan completed in June 2021. The main outcomes related to strategies for weed control – including declared weeds Gazania, Bridal Creeper and Boxthorn plus environmental weeds Onion Weed, Galenia, Sage, Scabiosa, garden lilies and Golden Pallenis and grassy weeds such as wild oats. Management recommendations included increasing height of slashing and not slashing in spring to encourage native plants to seed and reduce seeds of weeds.

The area is managed with support from Yorke Peninsula Council and local volunteers, with grant support from Northern & Yorke Landscape Board and Coast Protection Board. Slashing has continued on the site edges in all seasons and central conservation areas except during spring.

Weed spraying has reduced the cover of all target species. The wonderful rain this year has produced the best growth of native plants for many years. Take the chance to walk the site.

With the excellent season we have an opportunity to harvest seed from the area for the first time. The seed could be used to sow areas that have been depleted of native plants or have reduced diversity. Seed harvesting will occur over the next 3 weeks or so as seed matures and weather permits. Slashing of the main areas will then occur again.

**Fire risk.** Managing fire risk is important. One of the advantages of native plants compared with annual weeds is that most native species take advantage of soil moisture and summer rain to remain greener during the fire season. Native species produce less burnable material and can help to lower fire risk. While the plants can look dense from the road, take the time to walk through the site and observe the greenness of plants and the relative cover of the ground compared with more weedy areas such as some areas along the cliff tops.

It is with mixed emotions that I write this report, as this will be the last report I write for Antics as I have tendered my resignation effective 2<sup>nd</sup> of December, 2022.

The challenges of being responsible for ACH have become increasingly difficult which is the job, but meeting compliance in both, aged and acute standards, staffing shortages, budget restraints and how can we forget COVID has been a tough gig for all involved with ACH. It gives me great pleasure to state that ACH has survived all these challenges, so if there is a good time to leave and take the next step in my life this is the time.

There has been so much that has happened over the past 12 months, and I am happy to present to you our achievements.

Love them or hate them, audits and assessments are the only way to prove that you are providing the best person-centred care to our consumers and we have a "Top Notch" facility to match the required need.

The challenge that we have at ACH is that we are an independent stand-alone site, and even though we are small in size and numbers, we still have to meet the same compliance as the bigger players, together with our management team and the Board we have managed to achieve 3-year status in all areas.

We have also meet 100% compliance in food and safety, tri – annual fire and safety and financial audits – so for a team of 5 in management, this is a huge accomplishment.

To meet compliance, it is critical to move with technology. In aged care we have online programs, 'Person Centred Software and Medsig' which were pivotal in achieving compliance in aged care, our strategic plan has identified that we are needing to do the same for our acute services.

ACH is not alone experiencing staffing shortages and at times the gaps in the roster have been hard to fill. The main reason for the shortage for us is the decline in international staff – which of course is due to COVID lockdowns. We have also had the unpreventable retirements, pregnancies and staff relocation due to life style. We are actively trying to recruit staff, and now the hurdle is finding accommodation for them.

Our biggest success in recruitment is our affiliation that we have with the Ardrossan Area School. We have employed 5 students who are working in the areas of kitchen, maintenance and personal carer.

It is a breath of fresh air to see young faces, the residents love having them on site and the commitment to work, especially in a health environment is something that their parents should be extremely proud of. We are sure happy to have them.







I would like to acknowledge registered nurse Alison Black who retired after 40 years. Her knowledge and compassion to nursing is some that is hard to replace and she is definitely missed. This is what is amazing about ACH - is the years of service that staff give to us. Maria Hollitt has worked here for 45 years and we have 30 staff with over 10 years of continuous service. Leanne Hicks was acknowledged for 30 years, but sadly Leanne passed away suddenly in June this year, a great enrolled nurse who knew her stuff who is also missed.

Our acute services have been a hot topic of discussion and what is the future of our A & E service? This service is a high priority for our hospital to continue and remain. The issue for ACH is the funding and sourcing of medical doctors who can provide this service. In Ardrossan we have been very lucky with the support and loyalty that both Dr Babu and Dr Stanley have given us over the many years – many a life has been saved.

The reason why it has all changed is that we are no longer able to access the same service as we have done for many years sharing the on call with Maitland Hospital. However both the YNLHN and our Board are working at both local and state level to negotiate how we can fund this service and by speaking to all parties, including our doctors and ACH, the main statement is "this service needs to continue".

We are still providing acute care services, with on call doctors Monday to Friday 8am to 8 pm. Our admissions definitely have been low, but what we are seeing is a growth in our palliative care services, especially end of life care. We are seeing many people from all over the Yorke Peninsula request our services, we are just so proud that we can provide such respectful and dignified care.

Aged Care is obviously our core business and when we have external agencies visit our home the general comment is that they 'love the feel of our place – it is homely, the smell of freshly cooked meals, the hearing of laughter from everyone'. With the aged care environment being heavily monitored and criticised, it is wonderful to hear these words.

Dinham cannot move forward without the wonderful donations that we receive to buy all the extra items that we need to function. We are so grateful to receive donations from deceased estates, community clubs and the wonderful Hospital Auxiliary who donate on a regular basis. This money truly makes a difference.

We also need to mention the amazing **community support**, from our volunteers each day - the hands and nails helpers, walking groups, bingo, art and craft, and our very own garden angel Anne Hinspeter.

As you are aware, we have sold our dental practice to Dental Outreach. We are still owners of the building, and Dental Outreach lease the space. This decision was not made lightly, we didn't want to lose this service to our community, but as in nursing, finding a qualified dentist was becoming increasingly difficult to achieve. As dental was not our core business we felt that dentists should run the dental practice. We respect that there has been teething problems but Dental Outreach is a professional organisation that wants to provide a successful service.



What a 12 months, what an amazing seven years at truly the best job I have ever had. I thank all the people and families that I have cared for and trusting me in your most vulnerable moments, those memories will be with me forever.

I would personally like to thank Doug Barton for giving a very novice EO/DON the opportunity to have this wonderful work experience, you are a great mentor and I thank the Board for your support through the good and the bad.

Staff at ACH are amazing, they come to work to make a difference and they really do, you have all survived the hardest 2.5 years and if you can get through this you can get through anything. Special thanks to my left-hand person, Narita Stone. When you like to spend money and have nice things like I do, you need to have a good finance person behind you, we are a great team and we made a difference.

Visitation to our town appears to be on the increase with people coming from all over to enjoy, what we that live, here enjoy every day.

We are though, subject to some quite varied weather conditions. For the past few months, it's been uncomfortably cold and wet. Then conditions changed for a short time and it's been relatively warm. Great for weed growth which we're now trying to get on top of. The upside of this is our garden areas are blooming.

So, we had fewer members attend because of it being too cold and wet, now it has been a bit too warm for others. No happy medium! We must be thankful though that we have not experienced the heavy rains, rising rivers, flood conditions as well as the storms that have been experienced by other areas in South Australia and all the Eastern states. It's hard to envisage what they are going through now and into the foreseeable future.

Recycling of containers has increased as well, a result of increasing visitors to the town and some better fishing conditions. To aid in this, we have had the YP Council do a lot of work replacing pylons on our jetty. An expensive exercise when you consider the many jetties that they are responsible to maintain throughout the Peninsula. We know of many people who are regular visitors to our town from the city and other states as well, to take advantage of our jetty to fish and crab from.

The Memorial Park upgrade is looking very bare presently since we've had to remove a mixture of mulch, gravel, scoria, dolomite etc that has been deposited over the years for various reasons. Work will pick up soon with an irrigation system being installed to support the over 200 plants that will be planted, that's a lot of holes to dig and fill with decent soil to give them a head start.

Then we must restore the pathways, spread the mulch, do the plantings and then run the dripper pipes to ensure the plants have reliable water supply to grow well. Then the honour walls will have individual plaques and a WW1 history fitted to them. A lot of work, more than we had first thought, and we could do with some help if you've nothing to do on a Tuesday morning.

You may be interested to know that the Park was once the entrance to the then football oval at the southern end of the now garden. The garden began back in the earl 1920's by Mrs Hannah Cairns in honour of her son who was the first Ardrossan man to die in WW1. The present Lone Pine tree was planted on Arbour Day in 1936. Yes, that makes it 86 years old. It was then at most, about 2 feet (60 cm) high – look at it now! So, we've got a very busy time ahead of us, while still trying to carry out the normal works we do around town.
